The Prayers (from the New Zealand Prayer Book)

God, the source of all authority, bless our Queen, Elizabeth, her family and the family of nations she upholds; may she remain a worthy focus of our loyalty, and point us unfailingly to a higher commonwealth, the true humanity to which she and all her subjects owe allegiance; for you are the God of nations; you are our God. We make this prayer through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Bidding

Brothers and sisters in Christ and in our common God-given humanity, we gather here to give thanks for the armed forces of the Empire whose bravery and self-sacrifice delivered Europe and the world from enslavement by forces of great evil. We give thanks especially for those men who gave their lives in the fields of this village on the night of the 10th to 11th of September, 1942. We pray for those who, following in their footsteps, take up arms to defend freedom and humanity today in our Commonwealth countries and remember the strong bonds of blood and affection between the peoples of New Zealand and the United Kingdom. We remember also those nations oppressed by tyranny today as, in the words of Chesterton, our earthly rulers falter.

Lastly, as we pray for the peace of the world and the unity of all peoples, we pray that God's kingdom may come on earth as in heaven:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

We stand to sing:

- For the healing of the nations, Lord, we pray with one accord, for a just and equal sharing of the things that earth affords. To a life of love in action help us rise and pledge our word.
- Lead us forward into freedom, from despair your world release, that, redeemed from war and hatred, all may come and go in peace. Show us how through care and goodness fear will die and hope increase.
- 3 All that kills abundant living, let it from the earth be banned: pride of status, race or schooling, dogmas that obscure your plan. In our common quest for justice may we hallow life's brief span.
- 4 You, Creator-God, have written your great name on humankind; for our growing in your likeness bring the life of Christ to mind; that by our response and service earth its destiny may find.
